The DOJ is conducting the largest-ever college admissions prosecution. Fallout will likely include additional investigations, class actions, and constitutional questions, among other educational, regulatory, and employment issues.

Attorneys from our Education, Government Investigations, Commercial Litigation, and Labor & Employment teams were on hand to answer questions, such as:

- What should schools, colleges, and universities consider?
- What will happen to the college applicants denied admission?
- Do student athlete recruits have recourse?
- Will the Department of Education create new regulations?
- What about students and employees implicated by the probe? Can they be expelled or terminated?
- Are there any due process requirements?
